CAPT. Brian O. Walden

Captain Brian O. Walden, U.S. Navy (Ret.) is currently Visiting Assistant Professor/Interim Director of Bands at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. He returns to the Hampton Roads area after serving as Associate Professor, Director of Bands & Instrumental Studies and Interim Director of Music Education at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama from 2018 -2021. He previously served as the Director of Bands and Director of Music Education at Marshall University in Huntington, West Virginia from 2015 - 2018 where he was also the Coordinator of the Graduate Conducting Program. He has conducted international recording artists live and for television performances with Jason Mraz, James Taylor, Colbie Caillat, Take 6, Phillip Phillips (American Idol winner), Isaac Slade of the rock band "The Fray," Kenny "Babyface" Edmonds, Branford Marsalis (former Director of The Tonight Show Band with Jay Leno), TV and Broadway star Neil Patrick Harris, and performed with Natalie Cole as well as many other artists. except Antarctica. Brian holds a BA in Music/Religious Studies (Double Major) from Saint Leo University, Florida, a MM in Wind Ensemble Conducting from the New England Conservatory of University and PhD program in Music Education at George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia. In 2012 he was awarded the Outstanding Alumni Award by the Alumni Council of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston for his career contributions to the field of wind band conducting. He also holds a Graduate Diploma in National Security Strategic Studies from the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island. Upon retirement from active duty serving as the Commanding Officer/Conductor of the United States Navy Band Washington, DC (White House Support Unit) as the senior musician in the Department of Defense, Captain Walden was awarded the distinguished Legion of Merit by President Barack H. Obama for his 35 years of service to the nation. Additionally, in 2019 President Donald J. Trump awarded the National Medal of Arts, "the highest honor given to artists and arts patrons by the United States Government." Brian currently performs on trumpet with the Alabama Winds and maintains active studios in trumpet and conducting at Samford University. Captain Walden is an elected member and is an active member of the College Band Directors National Association, National Association for Music Education, Alabama Music Educators Association, Alabama Bandmasters Association and the National Band Association. Captain Walden is married to Staci Harris Walden, whom he met as a blind date for her high school senior prom. They have been married for 37 years and have two sons. Brian and Staci love sailing at their home on the Chesapeake Bay in Maryland and spending time with their grandson, Maverick Adonis.

Dr. Terry Austin

Terry Austin was the Director of Bands and Chair of the Department of Music at Virginia Commonwealth University. Under his leadership, the Virginia Commonwealth University Symphonic Wind Ensemble earned a reputation for musical excellence and performed at many professional conferences including the American Bandmasters Association, MENC, the College Band Directors National Association, and the Virginia Music Educators Association.

He remains an active guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator and is published in numerous journals and is the general editor of *The Journal of Band Research*, A Repertoire Anthology (1964-1989) published by GIA. Dr. Austin is a regular guest conductor of the Musashino Academia Musicae Wind Ensemble and is a Guest Professor of the Center of General Education of Guangdong University of Technology in Guangzhou, China.

Austin was the 78th President of the prestigious American Bandmasters Association. He served as the chairman of the National Band Association/William D. Revelli Band Composition Contest from 1995-2018, is chairman of the Bandworld/John Philip Sousa Foundation Legion of Honor, a member of the Board of Directors of the John Philip Sousa Foundation, and a past board member of the American Bandmasters Association, the National Band Association, the Southern Division of NAFME: The National Association for Music Education and past-president of the Virginia Music Educators Association. He is a member of the College Band Directors National Association, Pi Kappa Lambda, Phi Beta Mu, and an honorary member of Kappa Kappa Psi.

Dr. Austin is included in *Who's Who In America, Who's Who in Fine Arts Higher Education,* and *Who's Who Among America's Teachers.* He is a multiple recipient of the National Band Association's *Citation of Excellence* and in 2005 he received the Virginia Commonwealth University School of the Arts *Distinguished Achievement Award of Excellence.* Upon his retirement in May 2022, he was named Professor Emeritus and a Virginia Commonwealth University Distinguished Professor.

He founded and conducts the *Greater Richmond Youth Wind Ensemble*, an ensemble of the finest high school musicians in the Richmond metropolitan area, and the *Commonwealth Winds*, an ensemble comprised of Richmond area teachers and professional performers.

Austin earned a Bachelor of Music Education from Indiana University, a Master of Arts in Music Education from the University of Hawaii, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He lives in Richmond with his wife, Tracia.



Mr. Michael Oare

Michael Oare earned undergraduate degrees in Music Composition and Music Education from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. A veteran music educator, Mr. Oare remains active as a composer, arranger, performer, conductor and adjudicator. As a published composer, he has written numerous arrangement and compositions, with a special interest in music for the young band. Two of his compositions, To Dream in Brushstrokes and Equilibrium, are included in the acclaimed <u>Teaching Music Through Performance</u> series by GIA Publications. His compositions can be found in the catalogues of several major publishing companies, with all his most recent works being published by Hal Leonard.

Since 1991, he has served as the Director of Bands at Great Bridge Middle School in Chesapeake, Virginia. His Great Bridge Middle School Bands have consistently received superior ratings in the annual Virginia Concert Band Performance Assessment and have performed for the Virginia Music Educators Association Professional Development Conference on four occasions. He maintains State and National professional memberships, is a member of ASCAP, Phi Beta Mu, and performs as a member of The Virginia Wind Symphony. He is the 2016 Chesapeake School Middle School Teacher of the Year, a two-time recipient of the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence, and is a multiple year honoree in Who's Who Among America's Teachers. Mr. Oare resides in Chesapeake, Virginia and, in his spare time, enjoys off-shore fishing along the coasts of Virginia and North Carolina.

Founded in 2013, the Bay Youth Concert Band serves 7th, 8th and 9th grade band students from throughout the Hampton Roads area and is dedicated to enriching the musical development of our members. The Bay Youth Concert Band is one of six ensembles which comprise the Bay Youth Orchestras of Virginia, serving over 300 students with weekly rehearsals and presenting several concerts throughout the year. With the appointment of Michael Oare as conductor in 2015, the BYCB was restructured and expanded to include woodwind, brass and percussion specialists. Our instructional staff includes Stephanie Fisher, Band Director at Hickory Middle School, Eric Graybill, Band Director at Great Bridge Middle School, K.J. Stafford, free-lance percussion arranger and clinician and percussion instructor for the Santa Clara Vanguard, Santa Clara, CA, and Barron Maskew, Band Director at Hickory Middle School.



The Virginia Wind Symphony

The Virginia Wind Symphony, organized in 1994 by Dennis J. Zeisler, is a wind ensemble made up of professional musicians, military musicians, public and private school teachers, independent music instructors and Old Dominion University students. The group was created to provide a musical outlet for musicians throughout the Hampton Roads area and is dedicated to playing the finest original and transcribed wind literature available. Members benefit from the positive musical experiences brought about by music making in a spirit of camaraderie, and the opportunity to serve the region -- through a life-long love of music -- with concerts throughout the year.

The VWS has recorded six commercial compact discs featuring Frank Erickson Band Classics, music of Claude T. Smith, and with soloist Lynn Klock, a collective recording of solo saxophone literature with band accompaniment. These cd's are used nationally and internationally as standard band reference and resource material in the field of music education.

The Virginia Wind Symphony was invited three times to perform at the Midwest Clinic -International Band and Orchestra Conference Chicago: December 2004, 2012 and 2017. The VWS Performed was also invited twice to perform for the American Bandmasters Conventions: ABA Williamsburg, VA 2004, ABA Norfolk, VA 2011.

The Virginia Wind Symphony is honored to be a recipient of the John Philip Sousa Foundations' Sudler Silver Scroll Award! The Sudler Silver Scroll award is an international award to identify, recognize and honor those community bands that have demonstrated particularly high standards of excellence in concert activities over a period of time, and which have played a significant and leading role in the cultural and musical environment in their respective communities.

The Virginia Wind Symphony has a unique partnership with the Visual and Performing Arts Academy at Salem High School and the F. Ludwig Diehn School of Music at Old Dominion University. Through this partnership, the group has played for and accompanied the finest conductors and soloists, both nationally and internationally. Program Notes

Nebula by Randall D. Standridge

The expanse of space and all the celestial bodies therein have long provided inspiration for artists bound to earth and their imaginations soar amongst them, skimming along the rings of Saturn and traveling far beyond the Milky Way. Nebula attempts to capture and convey the awe one feels when spying these large bodies of gases and energies that can span light years in diameter. The sheer immensity of their size and beauty of their colors provide an everlasting testament to the mysteries of our universe.

Written for young musicians, the composer has taken care to provide an achievable work that maintains a high sense of artistic merit. Limited ranges and simple rhythms are offset by colorful orchestration and expanded harmonic language.

Lost Planet by Sean O'Loughlin

Movie and TV audiences alike have been fascinated with space operas over the years. From *Star Wars* to *Star Trek* and everything in between, the music has been an integral part of its popularity. For *Lost Planet* I wanted to explore some of these musical traditions that include an almost quasi-romantic nod to Richard Strauss, Gustav Holst, Gustav Mahler and more.

There are many musical textures throughout this work. Big augmented chords begin the work in a bold way to announce a departure to outer space. The pace soon quickens, with a full presentation of the melody to follow. A tradeoff between the winds and percussion continues this journey. A further nod to the quasi-romantic sound of modern space movies is heard as a counter to the rhythmic, fast section. This builds to a return of the bold chords and concludes with the return of the fast section to bring the piece to an out of this world ending!

Cloudspitter Fanfare by Jack Stamp

Cloudsplitter Fanfare was commissioned by the United States Air Force Band, Col. Lowell E. Graham, Commander and Conductor, and premiered in July of 1999 at the Twelfth International World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles (WASBE) Conference in San Luis Obispo, California. The work is dedicated to American composer Richard Danielpour. I had the opportunity to study briefly with this incredible musician and teacher and more recently attended rehearsals and performances of several of his orchestral premieres. This work explores aspects studied in our lessons, with further exploration of dissonance, octatonic scale sets, and new approaches to rhythmic ostinatos.

Threnody for Challenger by James Sochinski

Threnody for Challenger

Commissioned by the Kempsville Jr High School Band,
Dwight Leonard, Conductor, for performance at the Mid-West International Band and Orchestra Clinic

Composed in the fifth anniversary year of the Challenger tragedy, THRENODY FOR CHALLENGER is not only a remem-brance of a great national loss, but also a salute to the spirit of the astronauts. The musical materials are derived from symbolic, literal, and numerological sources. The opening section, for example, sounds seven pointillistic events, representing the seven fallen astronauts. Likewise, the primary melodic material of the main theme centers on seven pitches. Fleeting motives from the elegiac passages are derived from the lives of each astronaut (a bit of a Chopin prelude for Judith Resnik, an accomplished classical pianist; a fragment of the Navy Hymn for Commander Michael Smith...). The binary representation for the seventy-three seconds of the mission (01001001) dictates a rhythmic motive heard

James Sochinski earned a B.M. from the University of Missouri/Columbia, a M.M. in Composition from the Peabody Conservatory of Music, and a Ph.D. in Music Theory from the University of Miami. The C.L. Barnhouse Co., Columbia Pictures Publications, and TRN Music Publisher have published over forty of his compositions and arrangements. During his tenure as Director of Bands (1978-1990) Dr. Sochinski was hired in 1977 to conduct the Highty-Tighties. Sochinski directed both the Highty-Tighties and Marching Virginias during the fall of 1978 during a time when a proposal to combine the two bands was being developed by the administration. When that plan failed, he was asked to decide which group he preferred to conduct, and Sochinski chose to lead the MVs beginning in 1979. The focus of the band was changed forever. Dr. Sochinski served as Director of Bands at Virginia Tech for 13 years. He taught Form and Analysis, Microcomputer Applications in Music, Band Arranging, and Colloquial in the University Honors College.

When the Stars Began to Fall by Fred J. Allen

My Lord, What a Mornin' is one of many anonymous spirituals sung in the fields and in worship by African-American slaves in the 19th century. In this setting, sonorities of the band are utilized that express a longing for the end of time, when there will be no sorrow, no pain. The last line of the refrain serves as the title for this setting.

Galactic Empires by David R Gillingham

- I. Battlestar of the Andromeda Nebula
- II. Eveningstar of the Magellanic Cloud

My lifelong fascination with the mysteries of the universe has come to fruition in *Galactic Empires*. Our understanding of distances on Earth, which have clear beginnings and endings, makes it inconceivable that the universe is endless. *Galactic Empires* is a musical journey through only three of an infinite number of galaxies, two foreign and one which is our own Milky Way. To gain the inspiration for this work, I let my imagination run wild and envisioned each galaxy as having a particular aura which is reflected in the music.

The work is set in three connected movements, each representing a "star" in a particular universe:

- I. Battlestar of the Andromeda Nebula -- Within the Andromeda Nebula Galaxy lies a star where hate radiates into its atmosphere creating a smoky, black cloud forming a ring around the angry sphere. Close to the surface, one can hear the incessant drumming rhythms of war, for this is an empire bent on destruction of all other life forms in the galaxy. Across the jagged, dark, cold landscape are thousands of doomed bases housing troops and weapons of annihilation. Multitudes of amphibious-like alien creatures clad in silver and black armor move in and out of the domes while hundreds of disk-shaped airships land and take off from the surface, all this occurring against the backdrop of a sky lit with explosions from other stars of the galaxy as they are one by one destroyed by the empire of the Battlestar.
- II. Eveningstar of the Magellanic Cloud -- In stark contrast to the Battlestar is the Eveningstar found in the center of the galaxy of the Magellanic Cloud. This is a place of beauty beyond words. Four suns of multiple colors shine upon this star, making the sky appear as a huge domed rainbow. Life on the Eveningstar is one of tranquility and peace. The aliens of this star are thin, stick-like beings with oversized heads and large silver and oval slanted eyes reflecting warmth, understanding, and superior knowledge. The inhabitants of this star are the most advanced of the entire universe and exist in a sort of utopic state.
- III. Earthstar of the Milky Way -- The Earthstar is the most vibrant and eclectic star to be found in any galaxy of the universe. The humans who inhabit this star have a most interesting history that reflects both the most hideous atrocities and the most marvelous achievements of its people. It has the potential to achieve a status equal to the Eveningstar of the Magellanic Cloud, but must begin to learn from the mistakes of the past. Still, a sense of joy and celebration radiates from the surface of the Earthstar ... an energy field created by unbounded faith and hope for humankind.

One Small Step by Michael Oare

In July 1969, Apollo 11 completed its mission to the moon and Neil Armstrong made his famous proclamation "That's one small step for man; one giant leap for mankind" as he stepped out onto the lunar surface. Michael Oare's descriptive work captures the drama of that moment and offers the option of using actual audio clips from the mission for a truly magical effect.

Michael Oare (b. 1960) earned undergraduate degrees in Music Composition and Music Education from Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia. A veteran music educator, Mr. Oare remains active as a composer, arranger, performer, conductor and adjudicator. He has written numerous arrangements and compositions, with a special interest in music for the young band. He is a recipient of the National Band Association's Citation of Excellence. Mr. Oare conducts the Bay Youth Concert band and he performs with the Virginia Wind Symphony. Mr. Oare resides in Chesapeake, Virginia, with his wife Chris and daughter Devin.

It was a time when Superman fired the imaginations of all our youngsters, and I was no exception. Many years later, Richard Donner asked me to compose the score for his film Superman; I was thrilled. Stars & Stripes by John Philip Sousa

Stars and Stripes Forever (march) is considered the finest march ever written, and the same time one of the most patriotic ever conceived. As reported in the Philadelphia Public Ledger (May 15, 1897) "... It is stirring enough to rouse the American eagle from his crag, and set him to shriek exultantly while he hurls his arrows at the aurora borealis." (referring to the concert the Sousa Band gave the previous day at the Academy of Music). [Quote] taken from J.P. Sousa, Descriptive Catalog of his Works Paul Bierley, University of Illinois Press

John Philip Sousa Washington, D.C. native and legendary bandmaster John Philip Sousa (1854-1932) wrote a dozen operettas, six full-length operas, and over 100 marches, earning the title "March King". He enlisted in the United States Marine Corps at an early age and went on to become the conductor of the President's Own Marine Band at age 26. In 1892 he formed "Sousa and his Band", which toured the United States and the world under his directorship for the next forty years to great acclaim.
