Conductor - Virginia Wind Symphony

Captain Brian O. Walden, U.S. Navy (Ret.) recently completed 2021/2022 as Visiting Assistant Professor/Interim Director of Bands at Old Dominion University in Norfolk, Virginia where he has remained this year to teach as an Adjunct Instructor in music education. He returned to the Hampton Roads area after serving as Associate Professor, Director of Bands & Instrumental Studies and Interim Director of Music Education at Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama from 2018 - 2021. He previously served as the Director of Bands and Director of Music Education at Marshall University in Huntington, West Virginia from 2015 - 2018 where he was also the Coordinator of the Graduate Conducting Program. He has conducted international recording artists live and for television performances with Jason Mraz, James Taylor, Colbie Caillat, Take 6, Phillip Phillips (American Idol winner), Isaac Slade of the rock band "The Fray," Kenny "Babyface" Edmonds, Branford Marsalis (former Director of The Tonight Show Band with Jay Leno), TV and Broadway star Neil Patrick Harris, and performed with Natalie Cole as well as many other artists. He has conducted ensembles and performed as a trumpet instrumentalist on every continent except Antarctica. Brian holds a BA in Music/Religious Studies (Double Major) from Saint Leo University, Florida, a MM in Wind Ensemble Conducting from the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston, Massachusetts, and studied in the DMA Music Education program at Boston University and PhD program in Music Education at George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia. In 2012 he was awarded the Outstanding Alumni Award by the Alumni Council of the New England Conservatory of Music in Boston for his career contributions to the field of wind band conducting. He also holds a Graduate Diploma in National Security Strategic Studies from the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island. Upon retirement from active duty serving as the Commanding Officer/Conductor of the United States Navy Band Washington, DC (White House Support Unit) as the senior musician in the Department of Defense, Captain Walden was awarded the distinguished Legion of Merit by President Barack H. Obama for his 35 years of service to the nation. Additionally, in 2019 President Donald J. Trump awarded the National Medal of Arts, "the highest honor given to artists and arts patrons by the United States Government." Brian has performed on trumpet and as Guest Conductor with the Alabama Winds and is currently the Conductor/Music Director of the Virginia Wind Symphony and serves with the Bay Youth Orchestras of Virginia as Conductor of the Bay Youth Wind Symphony. Captain Walden is an elected member of the American Bandmasters Association, the highest honor for Bandmasters in North America. Captain Walden is married to Staci Harris Walden, whom he met as a blind date for her high school senior prom. They have been married for 37 years and have two sons. Brian and Staci love sailing at their home on the Chesapeake Bay in Maryland and spending time with their grandson, Maverick.

Conductor - Virginia Wind Symphony

Terry Austin was the Director of Bands and Chair of the Department of Music at Virginia Commonwealth University. Under his leadership, the Virginia Commonwealth University Symphonic Wind Ensemble earned a reputation for musical excellence and performed at many professional conferences including the American Bandmasters Association, MENC, the College Band Directors National Association, and the Virginia Music Educators Association.

He remains an active guest conductor, clinician, and adjudicator and is published in numerous journals and is the general editor of *The Journal of Band Research, A Repertoire Anthology (1964-1989) published by GIA*. Dr. Austin is a regular guest conductor of the Musashino Academia Musicae Wind Ensemble and is a Guest Professor of the Center of General Education of Guangdong University of Technology in Guangzhou, China.

Austin was the 78th President of the prestigious *American Bandmasters Association*. He served as the chairman of the *National Band Association/William D. Revelli Band Composition Contest* from 1995-2018, is chairman of the Bandworld/John Philip Sousa Foundation Legion of Honor, a member of the Board of Directors of *the John Philip Sousa Foundation*, and a past board member of the *American Bandmasters Association*, the *National Band Association*, the *Southern Division of NAfME: The National Association for Music Education and* past-president of the *Virginia Music Educators Association*. He is a member of *the College Band Directors National Association*, *Pi Kappa Lambda*, *Phi Beta Mu*, and an honorary member of *Kappa Kappa Psi*.

Dr. Austin is included in *Who's Who In America*, *Who's Who in Fine Arts Higher Education*, and *Who's Who Among America's Teachers*. He is a multiple recipient of the National Band Association's *Citation of Excellence* and in 2005 he received the Virginia Commonwealth University School of the Arts *Distinguished Achievement Award of Excellence*. Upon his retirement in May 2022, he was named Professor Emeritus and a Virginia Commonwealth University Distinguished Professor.

He founded and conducts the *Greater Richmond Youth Wind Ensemble*, an ensemble of the finest high school musicians in the Richmond metropolitan area, and the *Commonwealth Winds*, an ensemble comprised of Richmond area teachers and professional performers.

Austin earned a Bachelor of Music Education from Indiana University, a Master of Arts in Music Education from the University of Hawaii, and a Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He lives in Richmond with his wife, Tracia.

Euphonium Soloist

Demondrae Thurman is professor of music in euphonium and chair of the Brass Department at the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music.

Thurman has an outstanding international reputation as a euphonium soloist, having performed in Europe, Asia, and throughout North America. Many of America's premier colleges and universities have hosted him as a performer and teacher, and he continues to be in high demand. Over the past 10 years, he has been an invited guest artist/ clinician at many of the world's prestigious euphonium festivals, including the International Tuba Euphonium Conference, U.S. Army Band Tuba and Euphonium Conference, and Leonard Falcone Competition.

Thurman is also an active chamber musician. He plays first euphonium and trombone in the Sotto Voce Quartet, which tours extensively. He also plays first baritone horn in the Brass Band of Battle Creek, a British brass band comprised of many of the world's best brass and percussion performers. In addition to his chamber music work, he is indemand as a euphonium specialist for symphony orchestras, including the New York Philharmonic, Atlanta Symphony, Sarasota Orchestra, North Carolina Symphony, and Philadelphia Orchestra.

The <u>Virginia Wind Symphony</u>, organized in 1994 by Dennis J. Zeisler, is a wind ensemble made up of professional musicians, military musicians, public and private school teachers, independent music instructors and Old Dominion University students. The group was created to provide a musical outlet for musicians throughout the Hampton Roads area and is dedicated to playing the finest original and transcribed wind literature available. Members benefit from the positive musical experiences brought about by music making in a spirit of camaraderie, and the opportunity to serve the region -- through a life-long love of music -- with concerts throughout the year.

The **VWS** has recorded six commercial compact discs featuring Frank Erickson Band Classics, music of Claude T. Smith, and with soloist Lynn Klock, a collective recording of solo saxophone literature with band accompaniment. These cd's are used nationally and internationally as standard band reference and resource material in the field of music education.

The Virginia Wind Symphony was invited three times to perform at the Midwest Clinic -International Band and Orchestra Conference Chicago: December 2004, 2012 and 2017. The VWS Performed was also invited twice to perform for the American Bandmasters Conventions: ABA Williamsburg, VA 2004, ABA Norfolk, VA 2011.

The Virginia Wind Symphony is honored to be a recipient of the John Philip Sousa Foundations' Sudler Silver Scroll Award! The Sudler Silver Scroll award is an international award to identify, recognize and honor those community bands that have demonstrated particularly high standards of excellence in concert activities over a period of time, and which have played a significant and leading role in the cultural and musical environment in their respective communities.

The Virginia Wind Symphony has a unique partnership with the Visual and Performing Arts Academy at Salem High School and the F. Ludwig Diehn School of Music at Old Dominion University. Fanfare Politeia is an homage to the origins of our democracy, and to the ancient sources that Madison, Hamilton, Jefferson, and Adams drew from in their conceiving and writing our Constitution. "Politeia" is a Greek word derived from "polis" (city). Aristotle used the term to represent concepts such as citizens' rights and constitutional government, while Plato's examination of justice – a book which we now call *The Republic*, in English – was actually entitled *Politeia* in the original Greek. Terpischore (1981) ~ Bob Margolis

Terpsichore (1981) is based upon dances from the Court of Henry IV of France by Michael Praetorius in 1612. Margolis details the piece:

Terpsichore is the Greek Muse of dancing. She is one of the nine Muses who are the daughters of Mnemosyne (the goddess of memory) and Zeus.

The beginning of this band work is a quiet invocation to the spirit of ancient dance, and is followed by a street scene depicting wild and savage goings-on. The energy level and tunes are explosive, the moods constantly and unpredictably changing. Speed, flexibility, and energy dominate. Towards the middle of the movement, a brass quintet plays the original Renaissance music upon which the movement is based. The invocation reappears, and the... (click here for more)

Heritage - Concerto for Euphonium ~ Anthony Barfield Commissioned by Don Winston and Chashama

"Heritage" Concerto for Euphonium was written specifically for Demondrae Thurman and commissioned by Don Winston. The work is based on specific areas of Ancient Egyptian civilization and is broken into three movements.

The first movement titled "Building the Pyramids" shows the process during the building of the three pyramids in Giza, Egypt.

The second movement titled "The Nile" paints a picture of the importance of the river for providing water, transportation and excellent soil for growing food.

The third movement titled "Thutmose III" focuses on Thutmose who was the sixth Pharaoh of the Eighteenth Dynasty Thutmose was known for having a strong army and created the largest empire Egypt had ever seen.

"Heritage focuses on Ancient Egyptian life as we know it but as a whole, tells the story of how we culturally, and often unconsciously, preserve the memories and ideas from our ancestors. (click here for more)

Be Thou My Vision ~ David Gillingham

It was an honor and privilege to compose this work for Ray and Molly Cramer in honor of their parents. The work is heartfelt, expressive and hopefully inspiring. The hymn tune *Slane* is one of my favorites and inspired me to compose a countermelody, which is likened to an old Irish ballad. Since *Slane* is, in fact, an old Irish ballad, the two tunes share this unique camaraderie.

The work opens with a medieval-like flavor of reverence leading to the first presentation of *Slane* (*Be Thou My Vision*) in D-minor stated in chant-like somberness by the euphonium. Following, the newly composed Irish ballad is sung by the flute, which leads to a dramatic statement of *Be Thou My Vision* by the full ensemble in A-major. The work is interrupted by a prayerful interlude. Following is the marriage of the two Irish tunes in D-flat major which.... (click here for more)

Who's Who in the Navy Blue ~ John Philip Sousa

Sousa composed Who's Who as a request of midshipman W.A. Ingram, president of the class of 1920 at the US Naval Academy. It had become a custom for each graduating class to have its own new song or march performed at graduation and the class of 1920 bypassed all other options in favor of "the March King". Sousa had served in the navy in World War I, and the Navy connection no doubt had a great deal to do with their decision. The march is dedicated to Tecumseh, the

famous Indian statue that stands outside Bancroft Hall at the Naval Academy. Sousa even included words for the midshipmen to sing, in the trio of march:

The moon is shining on the rippling waves. The stars are twinkling in the evening sky. And in our dreams Tecumseh softly tells us We'll be Admirals by and by.

Deep River ~ arr. Andressa Luz

Deep River is an anonymous spiritual of African American origin. It has been sung in several films, including the 1929 film version of Show Boat, although it was not used in the original show. The melody was also adapted into the popular song Dear Old Southland, in 1921. Actor and singer Paul Robeson performed Deep River accompanied by a large male chorus in the 1940 movie The Proud Valley.

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Wallace Bryan Wills U.S. Army CWO (Ret) June 19, 1954 - March 5, 2023

It is with profound sadness that we announce the passing of Wallace Bryan Wills, 68, on Sunday March 5, 2023 while wintering in Florida with his wife, Ginger, by his side. Bryan was a dedicated family man and passionate about his work, his friends, and his country. He and Ginger spent their last two years together "chasing 70" and traveling the country in their RV.

Born to a military family stationed in Nuremberg, Germany, upon his family returning stateside he began studying clarinet at the age of nine in the Maryland public school system and graduated from Pikeville College, KY with a degree in Music Education. He pursued graduate work at Butler University in Indianapolis, studying with the famed clarinetist Achille Rossi of the Indianapolis Symphony. Bryan later entered the U.S. Army Band program and performed as solo clarinetist with the 74th Army Band in Indianapolis, the 76th Army Band in Kaiserslautern Germany, and the 1st Cavalry Division Band at Ft. Hood TX. He then completed the Officer Bandmaster courses at the Armed Forces School of Music, Little Creek Naval Amphibious Base, Norfolk, VA and Aberdeen Proving Grounds, MD and was commissioned as a Warrant Officer. Bryan's first command was the 101st Airborne Division Band, Ft. Campbell, KY. He later led the 3rd Armored Division Band, Frankfort Germany; and the 493rd V Corps Band in Wiesbaden, Germany.

After 22 years with the Army, his final embarkment before retiring was that of Directorate of Training and Doctrine at the Armed Forces School of Music. During his distinguished military career Bryan was awarded the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star Medal; the Meritorious Service Medal (3 awards); the Army Commendation Medal (3 awards) and the Army Achievement Medal.

Shortly following Army retirement, Bryan assumed the position as Director of Bands for Currituck HS in North Carolina. In 1999 he accepted the position of Director of Bands at F.W. Cox High School where he was honored as a Distinguished Educator twice and earned 2 Honor Band designations. Following his time at Cox he spent three years at Kempsville High School where he again was awarded an honor band designation. He accepted the band director position at First Colonial HS in 2010.

After over 23 years of teaching music in the Virginia public school system, retirement was once again knocking at Bryan's door. His final gift to music education was in supervision of music student teachers through James Madison University. During his lengthy and notable tenure, he taught hundreds of music-hungry students - inspiring many to become teachers themselves - Music Theory, High School Band, String Orchestra, and even eager pre-K music students towards the end of his career.

In addition to his teaching position, Bryan also conducted and performed clarinet and saxophone professionally with numerous concert and jazz bands in the United States and Europe and entertained many as a member of and regular performer with the Virginia Wind Symphony.

Preceded in death by his parents Ruth and William Lewis Wills, brother Cary Wills of Ashland KY; and his companion feline "Mimi". Bryan is survived by his loving wife Ginger and a large, adoring family; daughter Amanda and son Jason; son-in-law Nicholas and daughter-in-law Jennifer; sister Patricia (Danny) and brother Mark; grandchildren Addison, Aubrey, Benjamin, Alexander, Emily, Kyle and Nolan. In addition to his cherished family, Bryan enjoyed the company of numerous friends, fellow servicemembers, students and acquaintances far and wide. He will be truly missed by all who knew him.

The second movement begins with a quintet of gently chirping flutes, followed by a slow Spanish dance for solo harp and then band. Next comes a brazen ballet, *Amazones*; and finally a loud chime introduces a scintillating and vibrant jumping dance, or "volte," coming to a breathless and abrupt close.

The third movement begins with a bright xylophone solo, followed by a series of "bourrées." Sounds are bright and transparent. The end of the movement reproduces, as nearly as is possible in the modern symphonic band, the sound of an actual Renaissance wind band.

The final movement – the longest, most complex, and most exciting one – begins with a sprightly "gaillarde" for solo organ. This is followed by a series of warmly peaceful variations called "reprinses," next comes a unique series of tunes that feature the individual instrumental choirs of the band. Finally, an exhilarating and strongly rhythmic "volte" first shows off the euphonium soloist, and builds energy to a resplendent close.

The work is filled with symbolism and emotion, but two particular musical elements evoke aspects of the metaphysical in unexpected ways: the pervasive use of percussive metals and the choice of a lullaby at the end. The bright, glittering shimmer of the metal percussion recalls the imagery found in Ecclesiastes 12:7, "Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was: and the spirit shall return unto God who gave it." Although the physical body no longer endures, the soul, represented by the tuba, remains and sings a sweet, restful melody above the accompanying notes of the piano. By harmonizing with the other brass instruments, the soul initially lingers with the family, then, as indicated when the piano rises from the lowest D to the highest, it ascends to heaven. Dust...spirit...soul. As Shakespeare's Prospero said, "We are such stuff as dreams are made on," and what better way to end this piece than with a lullaby, rocking us to sleep and continuing the dream.

John Philip Sousa b. November 6, 1854, d. March 6, 1932 and was the best known composer and conductor during his lifetime. Sousa was the 3rd of 10 children! Antonio Sousa, J.P.'s father played trombone in the U.S. Marine Band. When John Philip was 13, his father enlisted him in the USMC as an apprentice, which continued for 7 years. In 1867 Sousa set out on his own where he played violin and learned to conduct. In 1880, at the age of 26, Sousa became the leader of the Marine Band and held that position for 12 years. Dr. Gillingham earned Bachelor and Master Degrees in Instrumental Music Education from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and the Ph.D. in Music Theory/Composition from Michigan State University. Many of his works for winds are now considered standards in the repertoire.

Currently [2021] Dr. Gillingham is a professor of music at Central Michigan University and the recipient of an Excellence in Teaching Award (1990), a Summer Fellowship (1991), a Research Professorship (1995), and most recently, the President's Research Investment Fund grant for his co-authorship of a proposal to establish an International Center for New Music at Central Michigan University. He is a member of ASCAP and has been receiving the ASCAP Standard Award for Composers of Concert Music since 1996.
